GUILDLINGS: DISNEY'S PETER PAN, JR





This summer, I had the pleasure of directing the Guildlings' production of *Disney's Peter Pan Jr. – The Musical*. The Guildlings has always been a bit of a "family tradition" around the Guild, and this year was no exception. Almost the entire production team had a family member in the production. I was able to share the experience with 3 of my own children: Blake, Claire, and Max. The experience took me back. It reminded me of the days of a theater full of children. I remember working on some of the early Guildlings productions, and, as a newer member in those days, I was amazed at the amount of dedication that went into those productions.

If you look through the current Guild roster, I think that you would be amazed to see how many of our current members were Guildlings first. The summer musical offered them a chance to find out what it meant to be in a performance on the Guild stage. Most of them caught the bug. And most of them have stayed with us. As we approached this summer's production, we made it our goal to offer that same opportunity. The Guildlings program is not just a "workshop"; it is not just a money grab to bring people in and sell them a bunch of tickets to see their kid in a show. It is more than that. It is an experience. Some of the children involved have never even been inside of a theater, let alone stepped on stage. Then on the other hand, we have had 11-year-olds with more stage experience than some of the adults. That's what makes the process work so well. It is a reflection of the Guild as a whole, seen through the eyes of children. Everyone is able to find his or her role. For some, it is to dance. For some, it is to sing. For some, it is to help paint a set, or run a light board.

This summer we cast 47 children in *Peter Pan*. Not only did we get an enormous group of "theater kids", but we also found an enormous group of "theater parents". Each summer, we bring more kids in to experience theater, but we also bring in more adults. Just this summer alone, we found new members who were interested in set design, costumes, stage crew, and construction (just to name a few). So, not only do we foster a group of future Guild members, but we also find ourselves bringing in new parent members who are looking to make the Guild their home as well.

I will never forget the first time my daughter turned to me and said, "I just love the way the Guild SMELLS." To some, it may sound funny. To me, it made perfect sense. We share the same sentiment. It is one of those things that I had always wondered. I have always thought that there was something about the way the Guild made me feel that was calming. It was something in the air. I just assumed that I was the only one that ever thought it might be the smell. But I wasn't. And I found that out because I shared my experience with my daughter. A great majority of us are members of this group because we have a love for it. Working with children may not be for everyone, but if it is something that you enjoy, then I would implore you to get involved with future Guildlings productions. Share your experiences. Share your experience.

STARSHINE THEATRE WORKSHOP

The eighth Starshine Theatre Workshop took place August 7 -11 at the Guild. Once again the collaboration between the Neighborhood Service Organization and the Players Guild was a great success. The participants were mainly from the Life Choices unit at NSO, and have an intellectual or developmental disability. This year 25 participants took place in the workshop and the show. The goal is to give the participants a real taste of theater, and with it gain those things that we know comes from participating in this art.

Putting this workshop on is no easy task. It does not happen without the dedication and talent of the members of the Players Guild. Twenty-seven members of the Guild spent at least one day



helping to do whatever was needed. This included helping with activities, rehearsals, assisting in the performance, making costumes, props, makeup, taking headshots and organizing the afterglow. This year the show presentation was *Pirates – The Musical*, which was our first purchased show. Following so closely behind the Guildlings, *Peter Pan Jr.* allowed us to use set pieces and some of the costumes and props from the show.

While this was truly a team effort, I would be remiss without acknowledging Guild members who gave so much of themselves to make the workshop happen. Marybeth Kinnell was a phenomenal director whom the kids clearly love and who is phenomenal in her ability to hold the actors' attention and challenge them. These kids never let us down in their ability to meet whatever was requested of them. Margaret Kinnell, who was our first Starshine director eight years ago, engaged the participants through icebreakers and acting games and activities. She taught them "theater language" like upstage, downstage, stage left and stage right through interactive movement. Anna Dewey added a wonderful dimension to the workshop by acting as music director. With her own little pirates in tow, she led the teaching of songs that were entirely new to the group. Anyone who saw the rehearsals or saw the show can testify how well this was done. Seeing Anna holding her daughter, playing the piano with one hand and directing the actors won't be forgotten. Inez Hernandez again adjusted his busy schedule to act not only as head costumer, but took the part of the "Narrator." At least 35 people had costumes, and each one was unique and wonderful.

While Marybeth, Margaret, Anna and Inez get well-deserved accolades, Guild members and Guildlings Matt Apostle, Molly Boudreau, Andrew Brown, Allison Calder, Tim Carney, Graham Dallas, Lilliana Greimel, Scout Greimel, Hailey Hayward, Renee Hayward, Mary Ann Kandah, Maddie Kaplan, Lexie Kaplan, David Kanclerz, Lily Kanclerz, Mike Kinnell, Mike Moseley, Lois Sczomak, Jana Smith, Tom Sparrow, David Wood, Ava Zanardelli, and Ryan Zanardelli all did things that were very special and meant a great deal to the workshop, the kids and me.

While the show probably shouldn't be the focus, we all know that it inevitably does and once again it was both delightful and moving. I couldn't say it better than what **Paul Bruce** wrote on Facebook so I will leave you to read that piece on the Guild website. About 150 people came to the show and it was wonderful to see so many Guild members, many of whom have not missed a performance, be part of the audience.

The Neighborhood Service Organization is very grateful to the Guild. At least fifty NSO people either helped with the performance or came to be part of the audience. Starshine is an opportunity that is not often available to the people we serve, which NSO is well aware of. It's good to see NSO people learning about the Guild (some have joined) and seeing Guild members learn a little about NSO.

To visit this rather large exhibit of Guild productions, go to the website at www.playersguildofdearborn.org, click "About Us" in the main menu, then in the pull-down menu click "Past Shows."

On the "Past Shows" page, the shows are listed by season. There are cast pictures for most of the shows. If there is a ** after a show title, it means there is a set of show pictures. Click a show title and you'll be taken to the show's page. There, you can find lists of the cast, crew, and orchestra, if any.

Scroll down to the bottom of a show page to find a link, if any, to show photos. In the collection, there are over 7,400 photos.

Our Webmaster, **Tom Sparrow**, would like to begin including photos from shows that were produced prior to the year 2000 and fill in the blanks for shows done starting in 2000 for which there are no pictures.

If you have hard-copy photos you would be willing to loan him, he can scan them and add them to the site. The same thing goes for the printed programs of shows that went up prior to 2000.
