

White Christmas brings holiday cheer to the Players Guild of Dearborn



Limited Tickets Available for Nov. 13-15, 21-22, 27-29 and Dec. 4-6

Start your holidays with the musical magic of Irving Berlin's "White Christmas" Nov. 13 through Dec. 6 at the Players Guild of Dearborn. Based off the 1954 movie musical starring Bing Crosby, Rosemary Clooney, Danny Kaye and Vera Ellen, *White Christmas* the stage musical features audience favorites including "Sisters", "Snow", "The Best Things", "Count your Blessings", "Blue Skies" and more.

Directed by Guild veteran Brian Townsend, who is assisted by Guild President, Mike Moseley, *White Christmas* follows two former army buddies Bob Wallace and Phil Davis played by Lindel Salow and Greg Phillip Viscomi, respectively, who team up with sisters Betty and Judy Haynes, played by Kathleen Duffy and Carissa Madley to save their former general's (David Wood) ski lodge when it falls on hard times. Romance, misunderstandings and mischief, mixed with memorable song and dance numbers, make the show a great way to kick off the holiday season.

"It's just such a wonderful story about people coming together and helping each other out in ways that they don't really realize, and how each of us has a gift to share whether we know it or not," Townsend said. "There is some inherent sweetness to this story that will certainly make you feel good and will put a song in you. I defy anybody to walk away without singing one of these songs as they are leaving the theater."

The production team is led by Producers Ron Williams, Jr. and Marc Walentowicz. The music direction and choreography are provided by Paul Abbott and Jenny McPherson, respectively. The cast also includes Denise Kowalewski-Tucker who plays Martha Watson, 11-year-old Jamie Paschke as Susan Waverly, Paul Bruce as Ralph Sheldrake, Meg Kisch as Rhoda and Juliette Abbott as Rita.

The ensemble includes Tom Sparrow, Trevor Berry, Diane Cliff, Allison Crawford, Melissa Foster, Katie Garber, Katelyn Harrison, Casey Irwin, Maddie Kaplan, Adam Lynch and Ashley Youngheim; Amanda Chatila, Alexis Mosley, and Tim Carney and Jeff Lokken.

Amy Moore

"Don't let them do this. Someone help him please." – Spoken deadpan by the Virgin Mary at the 4th Station of the Cross, where Jesus meets his mother. Only this Virgin Mary was in the 2nd grade, and she was Amy Moore, making her stage debut.

A couple things about Amy to get us started. She has an impeccable memory (she didn't miss a beat when reciting the above lines as Virgin Mary) and she was born with a passion and gift for theater, which would prove to enrich her life not only with performing opportunities, but also with a husband, and three beautiful children.

When Amy started high school at Dominican, an all-girls school on Detroit's east side, she somehow hadn't heard about auditions for their fall show. She went to the performance to see her friend in it, and during the whole show Amy sat there thinking, "Why aren't I in this? Why aren't I on stage?" From then on, she was in every production. She also performed in Notre Dame High School's shows and joined the Alger Community Theater (at Warren and Outer Drive). She acted onstage somewhere for the rest of her high school career with the exception of one show - Notre Dame's West Side Story.

A third thing about Amy. Maybe this will come as a surprise. She has two left feet. As you know, *West Side Story* is a tad heavy on the dancing. Well, Amy Purrenhage couldn't "spot" when she did her turns. The choreographer tried to help, but Amy just kept falling into the chairs. So Amy evaded injury (for now), and her role was changed to Student Producer at the all-boys school production.

At Wayne State, Amy was in *The Music Man* at the Bonstelle, and many student-directed shows and scenes like "Yerma" and that old classic, "Brown Silk Magenta Sunsets". She became a "theater gypsy" and began doing shows at other venues after that. She played the Milk Seller in *Oliver* at Stagecrafters, did *Seven Brides for Seven Brothers* there as well, and performed as Golde in *Fiddler on the Roof* at Warren

Civic Theater. Then she saw a blurb in the Detroit Free Press for auditions for *The Sound of Music* at the Players Guild of Dearborn. She auditioned. She got a part... and a husband out of it.



Amy's been married to Richard 15 years, and together they have Peter (age 14 and a Freshman at U of D Jesuit), Julian (age 12 ½ and in 7th grade at Divine Child), and Justine (age 9, in 3rd grade at DC, and still says every day to Amy, "I love you, Mommy. You're my hero.") Amy is all about family. She is one of 5 sisters, who all still live in the metro Detroit area, and she makes it a priority to gather regularly with them and her parents for potlucks and get-togethers. Amy takes care of her father-in-law, Leonard, as well as other extended family, and plays chauffeur for the many rehearsals, pack meetings, school activities and other events that she looks forward to partaking in with her kids. Sometimes that includes a Tigers game, which is a favorite family affair.



Amy worked for EDS (Electronic Data Systems) for 24 years doing various jobs ranging from delivering computer reports, to working in Secure Processing writing GM's checks, to being in finance at the Tech Center. She has also worked for the Guild's Brad Martin, and now spends her time at the Divine Child High School cafeteria, keeping an eye on all your kids. She volunteers at DC as Book Bank Coordinator and homeroom mom, and spends time with Justine in her American Heritage Girls club. Oh, yeah, and sometimes you'll see her at the Guild. She's been a member here for 19 years this November. Let's let Amy take the stage to tell you about that...

AMY AT THE GUILD:

How did you and Richard meet? *The Sound of Music* cast was woefully short of men, so Richard was recruited to play a waltzer (he vehemently denies any resemblance to a Nazi or the Aryan Nation!).

How have you been involved at the Guild since then? What shows have you worked on? Actually, in my 19 years of membership, I've only been cast in 10 shows: The Sound of Music, Crazy for You, Baby, Love Letters, Hunchback... the Musical (Guildlings), Bye Bye Birdie, Man of La Mancha, Home for the Holidays, Joseph and His Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat and South Pacific. I've also helped on various committees through the years. I distinctly remember working the ticket booth for the run of A Funny Thing Happened... Bob Jones was cast in the show, Richard was working in NYC and I was a very large pregnant woman working in a very tiny hot space :-) I also co-costumed The Music Man with Kim Donovan. We won the PAGE award that year thanks to her talents. :-)

How and when did you get involved on the Board? I was asked by my then boyfriend, Richard, who was the sitting PGD President, to temporarily fill the Treasurer's position that had been vacated by honorary Guild member, Elna 'EJ' Johnson. That temporary assignment lasted 17 years! I loved (almost) every moment of it. Prior to that, I remember reading our News & Cues 'Member Spotlight' on Jean & Dick Drew. Jean had also served as PGD Treasurer for many years and commented on how much she liked it, so perhaps I was already in the right frame of mind when asked.



How have your kids been involved? Peter was 7-1/2 months old when Lisa Andres added him as the 'prop baby' to Mike and Eileen Donovan Lopez' family in *Damn Yankees*. He's been onstage ever since. Julian was Baby Quasimoto in the Guildlings' production of *Hunchback... the Musical* when he was 16 months old. He prefers to work behind the scenes. Justine recently made her stage debut in the Guildlings' *Little Mermaid* last summer. She is hooked!

Tell us about the "Amy injury curse" with you in shows. Ha! I fell and broke my foot onstage during the Moorish Dance on the Opening Night performance of *Man of La Mancha* in 2005, but because I was playing a tortured prisoner, director Bob Jones allowed me to continue in the show with my cast bandaged in rags. On Opening Night of *South Pacific* in 2014, I fell down the steps at my children's school. Luckily, that did not turn out to be a break, but Dr. Colleen Meade-Ripper (Bloody Mary) had to bandage me up that first weekend.

What's your "I wish I could do that" job at the Guild? (e.g. lighting, directing, costumes, etc.) I've been lucky enough to try most jobs I'd want to do. I don't consider myself very creative, so working behind the scenes (and behind the scene shop!) best suits me. I have many happy memories of all-night/all-weekend sessions of filling season ticket orders, completing postcard mailings, and painting sets into the wee hours of the morning. Richard even had me filling out the season ticket seating chart the week after I gave birth to Peter!

What keeps you coming back to the Guild to work on shows? Well, if I ever want to see my husband, I need to stay involved. The Guild was definitely grandfathered into our marriage agreement. I've always loved that the Guild has an 'at home' feel, where members can just stop by and hang out whenever they want. There's almost always someone at the Guild at most hours of the day or night.

Favorite Guild show you've worked on and why: I've loved them all, but *South Pacific* was the most fun. I always came home from rehearsals happy. The cast made me laugh every night and Brian Townsend is the most generous director and actor. I loved *Joseph...* because I got to be in a show with my kids, even though the dances scared the heck out of me. It was a fast show. Between the adrenaline rush of costume changes and the sea of cast members, it was a wonderful experience for me. Of course, *Crazy for You* holds a special place in my heart because of Richard.

What show would you love to do? *The Pajama Game*, but that won't happen as long as Mike Moseley has any input. ;-)

Prefer to be onstage or behind the scenes? Onstage, but my kids aren't going to be this age forever, and theatre is for all ages, so I'll get back onstage one of these days.

And finally, in your 19 years, how have you seen the Guild change? Cliques come and go, people in power positions move on, but the Guild remains a great place to have fun, meet people, and put on some great shows too. The Guild is always evolving (that's good!) yet we've remained true to the by-laws that our founding members set down for us. Our theatre has been blessed with having 'the right people at the right time'. It's pretty amazing that the Guild has been around for almost 90 years. Most of my closest friends are people I've met at the Guild.

BEHIND THE SCENES WITH OUR BOARD: INEZ HERNANDEZ COSTUME GOVERNOR

If you have not met Inez yet, you need to. After just an hour of coffee with this guy, I felt like I had just met the World's Most Interesting Man. Originally from Ecorse, he is a second generation American of Mexican descent. His family members were migrant workers who came north from Mexico, his mother's family settling in Ohio and his father's in Texas. He is the middle child among 1 brother and 3 sisters and his whole immediate family is all still in the downriver area, including the 14 nieces and nephews. While he thoroughly embraces his role as uncle, he hopes to have a child of his own some day.

Inez grew up in a very musical household. His mom would wake him and his siblings up every morning singing. They sang with the radio, and sang while his father and any given sibling played along with instruments. They didn't have a lot of toys as kids, Inez explained. They weren't poor, but not well off either. Entertaining each other was a way of living. Everyone in their family was a comedian, entertainer, and singer. They'd sing in the choir and play in the band at church, and then they would go home and continue performing with each other. Think "Mexican Partridge Family".

In addition to singing, another of his many talents is drawing. He began drawing when he was in the 2nd grade, and by the 5th grade, the art teacher he had been studying under was taking him to art stores and encouraging him to do independent art studies. His mom still has pieces put away and framed that he painted as a child. Inez was the editor and cartoonist for his high school newspaper and won contests for his drawings. Despite his talent and success in this art, he didn't want it to be a career for him. It wouldn't have been fun for him anymore, he explained, especially when it involves a deadline.

Lucky for Inez though, he is a Gemini, which according to him, makes him "able to do everything". Brushing up on my familiarity with astrological signs, I decided to look up traits of a Gemini, and sure enough, Inez is the epitome of one. Versatile, enthusiastic about new and diverse things, brilliant communicator, witty and humorous. "A Gemini can easily keep you entertained and involved for hours." Had Inez not been running from his IT job in Ypsilanti to his next education class at Baker College (where he studies to become a Professor of Science), I would have happily taken a couple more hours of his time to discuss his world travel (many through his 13-year career at Ford Motor Company) to Japan, Brazil, Venezuela, Argentina, France, Italy, Canada, Dominican Republic and all throughout Mexico.



When not running the family restaurant, Taco Especial, Inez also spends time doing photography, painting, sculpting, dancing and even decorating professional cakes. He said he randomly started making cakes and his knack for it spread through word of mouth at the Guild and on Facebook. You can ask either Pat Denyer about his fisherman's birthday cake or a Guildling about his intricate *Little Mermaid* cake for their cast party. That is ultimately what led him to costuming at the Guild. He knew he wanted to do something creative, and was going to work on the sets, but was roped into costuming. Since Inez likes "confronting obstacles and breaking them down to tackle them", he welcomed this new direction of involvement at the Guild.

ABOUT YOUR BOARD POSITION:

This is Inez's first year on the Board. His primary responsibilities throughout the season as Costume Governor include: organizing the costume committee; planning out the season in regards to costumes and at the same time reassuring the other board and committee members (directors, producers) that the show will look just as fabulous as the talent that's on stage! He and Kathleen Duffy have set up a Pinterest board specifically for each show. It worked very well when they tried it for *To Kill A Mockingbird* and have used it since. The committee can begin organizing and pinning things for each show as they find them, and then when they meet with the directors and producers, can reference those ideas to demonstrate a particular style and check for historical accuracy. The production team can make additions or comments to the boards, which gives the committee feedback so they know what to pull or look for.

Inez's committee currently has 10-14 members, and he keeps getting calls from people who would like to help. For those of you who might be interested, Inez offered a great picture of the breakdown of his committee:

The Glue Gunners: These are the people creative with gluing and putting things together, gluing hats, beads, etc., and who do light hand sewing.

The Sewers: The machinists who can run a sewing machine, sew by hand, and take in and hem up garments easily.

The Sergers: Anyone who has a serger knows what this means. This takes sewing to the next level (like caring enough to stitch up seams to prevent frays).

Each one of these jobs is just as important as the other, according to Inez. Not everyone works on every show; they pull on talent as they need it. Sometimes they are able to pull a lot from the closet too. If you're a chairperson, you're responsible for putting the costumes together for the show and organizing what is needed, and Inez is always there for support.

Inez wants to express his gratitude to everyone who has been donating, and showing interest in the costume committee. He is floored by the number of people who have contacted him. "If you've made contact with us, please be patient with us, because not every show requires that much help; but please know we appreciate your reaching out."

Right now, the Costume Committee is in the process of reorganizing and updating the costume closet. With regard to help or donations, costumes could really use clear Rubbermaid tubs or "totes" to store clothing in. Thanks!

ABOUT YOUR INVOLVEMENT AT THE GUILD:

Inez joined the Guild 3 years ago, when he met Jake Dombrowski. He had been dating someone that knew Jake. Inez threatened/bet Jake that he was going to try out and get the lead in *Joseph*... having never done theatre before... He tried out and got a starring role as Judah.

Since then, Inez has performed in the chorus of *A Little Night Music*, as Mr. Phillip Bax/Bazzard in *The Mystery of Edwin Druid*, and as Paul in *Kiss Me Kate*. Though we all enjoy his musical talents, Inez is eager to do more roles with actual LINES. ©

When asked what has kept him at the Guild, Inez said it's mostly the ankle tracker that Jeff Bartos put on him. He says it keeps him within a 60-mile radius. Aside from that, the constant family environment. From people with family and kids to the "ancient ones" (his words, not mine!) that are always ready to do something to put on that next show. "Everyone has always been nice to me. Except for Kevin Dewey. He didn't let me sing in *Shenandoah*." *Editor and wife's note - for the sake of the aforementioned Kevin Dewey - *Shenandoah* predates Inez Hernandez at the Guild ©

Favorite show you've been in at the Guild: "All of them. Each role has been so different. From a jazzy, singing/dancing fool in "Too Darn Hot" (*Kiss me Kate*) to a sappy/feel-sorry-for-me and never-the-luck guy who doesn't love bananas in *Joseph...* I can't pick one, which definitely suits my personality."

What show would you love to see the Guild do? "In the Heights or West Side Story to bring a little Spanish flare to the Guild stage."

Prefer to be onstage or behind the scenes? "Onstage. I have a contract with the lighting guys that the spot has to be on me 80% of the time." Apparently he's got another contract he's working out for name to appear perpetually on the new marquee.

What's your "I wish I could do that" job at the Guild? (e.g. lighting, directing, costumes, etc.)

"I wish I could be president. It would allow me to work with each of the committees in each way. That's the cool thing about being president. You're helping each [governor] become better than they already are." He sees being president as a great way to give guidance and encouragement to others, and express gratitude to those volunteering their time. *Take note, nominating committee! *



PLEASE NOTE: The ages listed are the characters' ages, not necessarily the required age of the actor.

MR. GILBRETH (DAD):

Late 40's to mid 50's. Carries himself with the self-assurance of a successful man who is proud of his wife and family as well as his business accomplishments. Though a disciplinarian, he loves nothing so much as a good joke, preferably one on himself.

MRS. GILBRETH (MOTHER):

Late 40's to mid 50's. A gracious, attractive women. She is also a psychologist. In her own way she is often able to get better results with her large family more so than her disciplinarian husband. She never threatens, shots, or becomes excited.

ANNE:

The oldest, about 17. Attractive, sweet natured, but stands up to her father.

ERNESTINE:

About 15. Also the Co-Narrator.

MARTHA:

About 14. Speaks some German.

FRANK:

About 16. Also the Co-Narrator.

BILL, LILLIAN, FRED, DAN, JACKIE:

The younger children (ages variable from 13–5).

MRS. FITZGERALD:

The housekeeper, a kind woman who is completely devoted to the family. Sometimes her patience is tried by the ongoing chaos of the large family (age 50–70).

DR. BURTON:

The family doctor, a plain spoken man (age 40–60).

JOE SCALES:

Anne's age (about 17), a very short, cocky cheerleader.

MISS BRILL:

A teacher who has no love for the children and they have none for her (age 35–50).

LARRY:

Anne's age (about 17), nice-looking, clean cut boy. Anne's "special friend".
